A WORD FROM PASTOR STEVE

"Continuing On"

As we continue to trudge our way through these days of transition and uneasiness, primarily within our denomination, but also somewhat in our local church as well, a word of hope, encouragement, and direction would be mighty helpful, don't you agree? And as usual, I continue to find such help in Scripture. One particular lesson of note is found in Joshua 3. This is the time when Joshua has replaced Moses as the leader of Israel, (a BIG change for sure!!), and Joshua is now preparing the people to re-enter their homeland, which is often referred to as the Promised Land. They have been away from there for many, many years, and they are both excited and scared at the prospect of going back there. Part of their uneasiness is the fact that between them and their desired goal is a major **obstacle**, an obstacle known as the Jordan River, and it is at **FLOODSTAGE!** However, God directs Joshua to instruct the people to get up and move **toward** the river, while trusting God to actually provide a way forward **through** this very scary obstacle.

Now notice the specific instructions in verse 13: "As soon as the priests set foot in the Jordan, it's waters will be cut off...." Did you see it? The people were not to wait in their camps until the way was opened; they were to walk by faith. They were to break camp, pack up their goods, form in line to march, and move down to the very banks before the river would be opened. They must take **one step into the raging floodwater**, (thereby acting out their total confidence in God's promise to take them through it!), **before** the river would be cut off. And that's exactly what happened!

My friends, we **must** learn to take God at His Word and go straight on in duty and obedience, even though we can see no way in which we can go forward. We must **continue** to do what we know He wants us to do, regardless of the circumstances and obstacles. We must **continue** to proclaim forgiveness, deliverance, healing, and LIFE through personal faith in Jesus Christ! And we must **continue** to provide help for people's material and emotional needs! This is not a time to back off and become inactive! Nor to "wait and see what will happen"! The reason we are so often defeated by difficulties is that we expect to see them removed before we try to pass through them. But that is not God's way!! God calls us to first, "step into the water." So this time, let us not be found standing still, waiting for the obstacles to be removed. Rather, let us move forward every way possible, trusting God, as if there were no obstacles at all!

I invite you to join me in recommitting to:

Go where God tells us to go,

Do what God tells us to do, and

Be the people of faith that God calls us to be.

And be assured, dear hearts, there will be a great life awaiting us on the other side of all these obstacles, uncertainties, and changes! **God promised!....**

House of Barbour County in their ministry with needy persons in their area. Heart and Hand of Barbour County and Heart and Hand of South Charleston were both mission projects of the West Virginia Conference of the Evangelical United Brethren Church before the merger of 1968, which brought the E.U.B. Church and the Methodist Church together in the United Methodist Church.

Heart and Hand of Barbour County is in need of the following items for families who are expecting babies: diapers, crib linens, receiving blankets, clothing, towels, washcloths, baby powder, lotion, shampoo, bibs, and bottles. We are also asking for the following hygiene items for needy adults: shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shaving cream, razors, brushes, combs, Band-Aids, and toilet paper. Monetary donations would also be welcomed. Be sure to put C.O.M.E. on your check or your envelope. Please

First Friday Food and Fellowship Planned for May 3





Parsonage Issues Being Addressed

Our trustees have been busy with issues at the parsonage. Two circuits have been rewired. One light fixture has been replaced. The electrician will be returning to replace another light fixture and to address issues with the breaker box. A plumber corrected problems with toilets, replaced a gas line, and repaired a leaky drain.

The roofer who put on the new roof last June will be returning to eliminate the continuing roof leak. Two contractors have looked at our drainage problems and our structural problems. Once we have the house stabilized there will be sheetrock to replace, cracks to fill, and painting to be done.

In April the Administrative Board authorized \$12,000 for the parsonage in addition to the \$5,000 which is in the budget. We do not expect this to be enough for all of the work which is needed, however. We have some savings which we can use, but we hope that members will give speci al gifts for parsonage needs so that we will not have to use very much from our savings. 

week. Christians meet for worship on Sunday instead of Saturday (which is the Jewish Sabbath) because it was on a Sunday that Jesus rose from the dead. So, we celebrate the resurrection every Sunday.
