A Word From Pastor Steve

"Great Faith: Unwavering Confidence in God"

It seems to me that there are basically three stages of Christian faith. The first level of faith is when there are certain strong feelings, or perhaps a sign, like Gideon's fleece (Judges 6:36-40), accompanying and supporting it. The second level, a little stronger and more mature faith, believes God even when there is an absence of emotion or a sign. The third level is the highest, greatest, and most mature stage of faith. It believes God and His Word EVEN WHEN numerous voices scream against doing so! It believes God even when emotions, circumstances, appearances, people, and human reason all declare that trusting God in this situation would be ridiculous and disastrous!

The Apostle Paul exhibited this greatest, most mature stage of faith during the severe storm and shipwreck on his way to Rome in **Acts 27**. After many days and nights in the raging storm, nearly all 276 people on board had given up all hope of surviving. Then Paul stood up and said (vs. 23-25), "Last night an angel of the God whose I am and whom I serve stood beside me and said, 'Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you.' So keep up your courage, men, for I have faith in God that it will happen just as He told me."

This is the essence of **great faith**, of **mature faith**. It is simply **taking God at His word**. It is believing God and trusting God supremely. It is expressed clearly in that old adage, "God said it. I believe it. That settles it!" This is the level of faith lived out daily in the life of George Mueller, the renowned English evangelist and missionary who ministered in the 1800's. He had a deep love for God and a powerful prayer life that stemmed from his complete confidence in God. For example, on one occasion he was on board a ship headed for Quebec when it encountered a very dense and dangerous fog bank. It was so treacherous moving safely forward that the captain of the vessel had been on the bridge nonstop for an intense and slow twenty-four hours. It was then that George Mueller went to the captain and said, "Captain, I have come to tell you that I must be in Quebec by Saturday afternoon." The captain quickly responded, "It is impossible!" To which Mr. Mueller replied, "Very well, if your ship cannot take me, God will find some other way. I have never broken an engagement for fifty-seven years. Let us go down into the chart-room and pray."

The captain looked at that man of God and thought to himself, "What lunatic asylum can that man have come from?!" But he finally spoke, saying, "Mr. Mueller, do you know how dense this fog is?" "No", he replied, "my eye is not on the density of the fog, but on the living God, who controls every circumstance of my life." Then Mr. Mueller knelt down and prayed a very simple prayer. And when he had finished, the captain was going to pray, but Mr. Mueller put his hand on the captain's shoulder and told him not to pray. He then explained why, "First, you do not believe God will answer; and second, I BELIEVE HE ALREADY HAS, and there is no need whatever for you to pray about it." The captain just stared at him in shock until Mr. Mueller said, "Captain, I have known my Lord for fifty-seven years, and there has never been a single day that I have failed to get audience with the King. Get up, Captain, and open the door, and you will find the fog gone." So the captain got up, opened the door, and the fog was indeed gone! And on Saturday afternoon, George Mueller was in Quebec for his engagement...

Wow!! Don't you want that kind of faith, trust, and confidence in God?! You can! We can! You can grow it and develop it **if** you genuinely, earnestly, and regularly seek to know God and get close to Him! God desires this mature level of relationship with us!

All this reminds me of another great English minister who lived in the 1800's. He was the legendary preacher widely acclaimed as "the Prince of Preachers". He was none other than Charles Haddon Spurgeon. On one occasion, he practically shouted, "Oh brethren, be great believers! Little faith will bring your souls to Heaven. But GREAT FAITH will bring Heaven to your souls!" WOW!! Can I get an "Amen!" for that?

So, dear friends, let's decide to intensely pursue God and grow a GREAT FAITH. Let's simply, but fervently "believe God", no matter what. And as we do, I'm confident that we will see great things happen! Do you believe it??...

(PS: Maybe one of our battle cries should be: "CONQUER THE FOG!!" Just a thought....)

We have had lots of fun even though the teachers looked weary and tired. They all enjoyed chapel, especially the singing, and even with some tears there has been a lot of laughter.

I thought maybe fall was in the air since school has started, but no, the temperature is still in the 90's and it's definitely still summer. Here I am ready for pumpkin spice for my coffee and maybe a cinnamon roll or two, but we are sticking to popsicles and trying to stay cool.

God has been good to us at the day care by sending the right people to help us at the right time. So many times, in this busy life we all lead we forget that God knows our name. He thinks about us and has plans for us and when we need Him, He is our refuge. I have



been trying to stop during the day to look back at what God has done here for us at Morris because the day care is a ministry of our church, and especially what He has done in my own life. If you had told me last year my heart was ready to explode, I would have laughed at you since I was running up and down steps and working every day. I was having fun with the children and when I was told I had to have a triple by-pass, I have to admit I wasn't ready to accept what the doctors told me. I can see that this whole time God had His hand on my life. He had protected me even when I was so blind at what He had been telling me, I needed to slow down a little. My body was getting older, but I still felt like I was 20 in a 72 year old body. I am so thankful to be back to normal and able to run and play with the children. All I can ever say when someone asks me about my surgery, is "God is good all the time, and all the time God is good!"

Nurture N Action Team News

Nurture N Action has been very busy sending monthly cards to members and non-members of Morris Memorial who are unable to attend church at this time. Currently we have 30 recipients of monthly cards. In addition, if the Team learns of a need, either in the church or a friend of someone in the church, a card is sent. The aim of the team is to let the individual know someone is praying for them as well as lifting them in Christ's love. If a need arises beyond a card, it is addressed. Nurture does monthly cards in the season when appropriate - Thanksgiving, Christmas (we deliver the card with a small gift we have prepared), Valentine's Day, Easter, Mother's Day, and Father's Day. If someone on our list has not been a mother or father, we send an appropriate card for them. If there are guests in the Sunday services and they live in our area, we have a Bread Ministry as well.

Nurture N Action monthly prepares 24 bag lunches for CAMC General Emergency Department and 6 bag lunches for individuals in the community. The personnel at CAMC and Erin here at the church know if there is a need.

The bag lunch consists of: chicken salad, a cup of fruit, potato chips, cheese crackers, a cookie, and a bottle of water. It is our joy, pleasure and blessing to be involved in this ministry. Nurture also has baskets ready to prepare if a need arises due to a death in our congregation family. Through the years we have continued to expand on what we offer.



Nurture N Action meets every Monday at 9:30 a.m. in the church library and all welcome to join our

"little band of angels!" The team began in late 2011or early 2012, as a result of a seminar at Blackwater Falls on church growth and programming. Caudill Mission Trip Report 2019

Jim and Gloriann Caudill completed their recent mission trip to southern Mexico on August 10, 2019. We appreciate the support given by the congregation for this and previous trips. The congregation gave generously to help us send donated medical supplies to Mexico, and for the

first time in memory we did not have any supplies held up in customs. Most importantly we know many of you were praying for us while we were gone. We thank you so much for that.

Our project this year went very smoothly. We performed almost 120 cataract surgeries in our four days of surgery, and saw about 550 patients in our five clinic days. Most of those patients received glasses; many of them received eye

drops for various eye problems such as infections and glaucoma; and several were scheduled for surgery on future projects.

One of the doctors on the project put together a 10 minute video which shows a number of pictures of us at work, and the video includes some heartfelt words of appreciation from several of our patients. I encourage you to go to You Tube and look up "San Cristobal de las Casas Charles Cohn" and you will get a taste of the impact our project had on the people we served.
